Genesis 43-Exodus 21

XI. The Account of Jacob: 37:2-50:26: the big question: How did Israel end up in Egypt? We will see the hand of God in the preservation of his people

A. Day 15: Genesis 43-46

1. God Fulfills His Promise to Joseph Personally
 - a. The Famine Continues to Ravage the Land: 43:1-7
 - b. Jacob agrees to send Benjamin to Egypt: 43:8-18
 - c. God's prophecy to Joseph is fulfilled: 43:19-34: see 37:7-11
 - d. Conspiracy: 44
 - e. Disclosure of the identity of Joseph: 45: 1-4
 - f. Disclosure of the purpose of God's plan: 45:5-15
 - g. Jacob and the Family invited to Egypt: 45:16-28
2. God Fulfills His Promise to a Nation
 - a. Departure: 46:1-7
 - b. Expansion of the People: 46:8-27: 70 descendants
 - c. Family Reunion: 46:28-33

B. Day 16: Genesis 47-50

- d. Arrival: 47: 1-12
 - e. Fulfillment: Gen.15:13: the nation would be oppressed in Egypt for 400 years: God has his people where he wants them
 - f. God Preserves His People: Gen.47:13-28
 - g. Jacob will be buried in the Promised Land/ Canaan: 47:29-31
3. Explanation of the Promised Line of Christ: 48-50
 - a. Jacob blesses Joseph and his sons: 48
 - b. Jacob blesses his sons: this is an end to the patriarchal age, Jacob foretells what will happen to each tribe: 49:1-28
 - i. Notice the special attention given to Judah: 49:8-10:
 - ii. The Promised Messiah will come from the line of Judah: Ps.2, 45, 60; Isa.11; Rev.5:5
 - iii. The NT concept of blessing: emphasis is shifted from the material to the spiritual, and from the temporal to the eternal.
 - c. Jacob's death: 49:29-50:14
 - d. Joseph's promise to his brothers: 50:14-21
 - e. Joseph's death: 50:22-26
 - i. Genesis ends with Joseph's promise of release from Egypt: 50:24a
 - ii. It also shows how God's people will be back in their land: 50:24b

Introduction to Exodus

1. Three big events/ themes
 - a. The Exodus
 - b. The Giving of the Law followed by the book of the covenant
 - c. The Tabernacle
2. God's glory is the major theme of the Book of Exodus: see Ex.9:14
3. In Genesis we see that God has made many nations out of Abraham's descendants
4. When Exodus begins God's people are in bondage in Egypt, will God be able to keep his promise of land to His people?
5. Exodus seeks to answer the land question and it also sets forth a pattern for redemption throughout Scripture
6. The Second Exodus in Scripture, is seen as Christ liberates His people from the oppression of sin and Satan and brings them into his kingdom.

- c. Excuses 3-5: 4:1-17
- d. Moses Submits and Returns to Egypt: 4:18-28
5. Moses attempts to Deliver the People: 4:29-6
 - a. A Good Start: Moses and Aaron go before the People: 4:29-31
 - b. A Catastrophic Result: Confrontation #1: 5:1-23: the people get mad at Moses and Moses gets mad at God
 - c. A Follow Up Command: 6:1-11
 - d. The people no longer trust Moses: 6:12-13
 - e. The Ancestors of Moses and Aaron: 6:14-30: the genealogy links Moses and Aaron to the history of Israel and the importance of the Levites: Moses and Aaron fit within the overall framework with what God is doing through the nation

 - a. Confrontation #2: God's Instructions in Confronting Pharaoh: 7:1-13

- d. Confrontation #5: Third Plague: 8:16-19: plague of gnats
- e. Confrontation #6: Fourth Plague: 8:20-32: plague of flies
- f. Confrontation #7: Fifth Plague: 9:1-7: plague of livestock
- g. Confrontation #8: Sixth Plague: 9:8-12: plague of boils
- h. Confrontation #9: Seventh Plague: 9:13-35: plague of hail

F. Day 20: Exodus 10-12

- i. Confrontation #10: Eighth Plague: 10:1-20: plague of locusts
- j. Confrontation #11: Ninth Plague: 10:21-29: plague of darkness

III. God's Glory is Manifested in the Redemption of His People: 11-15

- k. Confrontation #12: Tenth Plague: 11-12:30
 1. The Plague is announced: 11
 2. The Passover is introduced: 12:1-27: the immediate and the future observance of the Passover is instituted
 3. The Plague is activated: 12:28-30
 4. The Power of God is Realized: 12:31-51: see the fulfillment of Gen.15:13,16 and Ex.3:9-12

1. Worship as Acceptable Response to Redemption/ Liberation: 13:1-16
2. God Guides His People in their journey to the Promised Land: 13:17-22
3. God Protects His People in their journey to the Promised Land: 14: the people complain but God gets the job done
4. God's People Celebrate the Victory that God Gave: 15:1-21: The Songs of Moses and Miriam
5. God's People are Tested: 15:22-27
